OPERATIONAL ASPECTS

A. Timetable:

- 1) Class-hour will be of 1 hour and the time schedule of classes should be from 10.30 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. with 30 minutes lunch-break during 1.30 to 2.00 p.m., from Monday to Friday. Thus there shall be maximum 6 classes a day.
- 2) Normal 16 class-hours in a week may be kept for direct class instructions. The remaining 14 hours in a week shall be kept for Tutorial, Dissertation, Seminar, Assignments, Special Classes, holding class-tests etc. as may be required for the course.

B. Course-papers and Allocation of Class-Hours per Course:

- 1) For evaluation purposes, each course shall be of **50 marks** and for each course of 50 marks total number of direct instruction hours (theory/practical/field-training) shall be 48 hours.
- 2) The full course in 4 semesters shall be of total 1100 marks with total 21 courses (Twelve Core Courses, One Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC), One Generic Elective Course (GEC) CBCS, Two Skill Enhancement Course (SEC), Five Discipline Specific Elective (DSE).

C. Credit Specification of the Course Curricula:

M.A. Course in Folklore shall comprise 4 semesters. In all, there shall be 20 courses of 4 credits each and one course of 8 credit. Each course shall carry 50 marks. Of these, 40 marks shall be reserved for theory (end-Semester examination) and 10 marks for tutorials/class-tests/assignments/midterm exams/seminars (internal assessment). However, in SEC-I, SEC-II, COR 311 & DSE 405 25 marks shall be reserved for theory (end-Semester examination), 25 marks for Report). In Course No. 21 COR 412, entitled Project Work/Term Work/Dissertation/Documentary Film Making, 80 marks shall be reserved for Project Work/Term Work/Dissertation paper evaluation, 20 marks for Viva-voce exam and Presentation.
